THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

09/10 JANUARY 2021

YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE

When the Lord was baptized, a voice came from heaven saying "This is my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." There could hardly be a more important message than this identification of Jesus, could there? But why did this important message come through a voice from heaven? A voice from heaven can be heard only by those who are there, then. What about everybody else? Surely, it is important for all human beings to know that Jesus is God's beloved Son. And the same sort of puzzle arises from the First Reading. It says that the Messiah will open the eyes of the blind, and the Gospels testify that Christ really did so. But he opened the eyes of only a few blind people, those blind people who were there, then. What about all the other blind people, in other places, in other times? Why didn't Jesus just heal all blindness everywhere with one impersonal command: let all the blind people of the world be healed? And so here is one thing we can learn from these Readings. In the voice from heaven, in the miracles of Christ, God shows that he is committed to the good of particularity. God does not send the news about the Messiah as an

impersonal message directed impartially to all humankind. He identifies Jesus as his Son by a voice from heaven heard by particular people at a particular time. Similarly, Christ does not issue an impersonal decree about nameless blind people taken as a group. Christ heals some particular blind people who happened to be at a particular place at the particular time when



Christ was also there. So you might feel that you are just an unnoticed member of your company or an invisible one of the many ordinary people in your town. But you stand out as the particular human being you are, where the Lord is concerned. God does not deal with people as faceless members of a collective. He calls, and he heals, one particular person at a time, as each individual comes to him. But then you yourself—not your Church or your group, but you—need to come to the Lord, to face him, to know him, to love him, and to let him heal you, whatever your needs and sufferings are. Come as yourself, as you are, here and now. -Eleonore Stump

Sundry Ruminations

A Weekly Column from Your Pastor

Baptism was the beginning of Christ's public ministry, and for us, it marks the beginning of our own lives as Catholics. Most of us don't remember our baptism, and unless you pay attention, there is a lot going on at a baptism that you may not notice. And I'm not talking about the water, the screaming babies, or the Christening gown that was worn by your great-grandmother's second cousin! No, I'm talking about the reason why it is celebrated.

One thing that you'll notice is that unlike other liturgies, baptisms don't begin with a hymn – they start with a question – "What name do you give your child?" Sounds obvious especially since most of us already know. But the sacrament is essentially about who we are and who we will be. We're being transformed, or as the ritual says, we're becoming a new creation. And having a name – an identity – is critical to that. In effect, the parents are saying that they're continuing God's creative work in the world begun in Genesis. Talk about a big day not for me, but for the child and the parents!

Baptisms too are all about commitment. I always love the South Louisiana lore about why folks pick this person to be a godparent over someone else. We think that's the person who's going to take my place as a parent if I die. But being a godparent, or sponsor, in the church takes commitment — to live the faith with fidelity in such a way that their godchild will say, "I want to be like that." Talk about a big day not for me, but for the child and the godparents!

Baptisms are also about community. Do you roll your eyes when I say during non-COVID times, "We're going to have a baptism at Mass today?" It always made me wonder why more folks *don't* celebrate baptisms during Mass. At one point, the priest tells the child, "The Christian community welcomes you with great joy." If there is no community, how are they going to welcome the child? Christians don't live in isolation, and that's why we do it together, in Mass, as one Church. Talk about a big day for not just me, but for the whole community.

God chooses to bring us into the world, and we need some help cooperating with that grace. And maybe that's the challenge for us too. Do we strive each day to be a new creation? Do we embrace our commitment to our baptism and all that it entails? Do we welcome those in our community that celebrate the sacrament? Baptism requires our cooperation with creation, constant commitment, and the support of the community. This our faith; this is the faith of the Church. Are you

proud to profess it?
