PONDERINGS OF THE PEDAL-N-PADRE

Dear Parish Family,

Peace in the Lord Jesus Christ as we enter the second week of Holy Lent! As I mentioned at most of the Masses last weekend, I promised to provide some catechesis on the use of Latin in the Sacred Liturgy. Contrary to popular opinion, Vatican II did not prohibit the use of Latin in the Liturgy. In fact, the first document produced by the Council Fathers (bishops of the Council) was Sacrosanctum Concilium, the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy. It addressed the use of Latin in the liturgy with a nuanced approach.

Sacrosanctum Concilium stated: "The use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites" (SC 36 n1). This statement clearly indicates the Church's intention to maintain some Latin within the Roman Rite. However, at the same time, the Council also recognized the pastoral benefits of using the vernacular language (in our case, English) within the liturgy: "Since the use of the mother tongue, whether in the Mass, the administration of the sacraments, or other parts of the liturgy, frequently may be of great advantage to the people, the limits of its employment may be extended" (SC 36 n2). This opened the door for the use of English, particularly for readings, instructions, and prayers in the Mass, which would allow the faithful to be more "in tune" with what is being prayed by the priest. One of the emphases the Council Fathers wanted to highlight was the faithful's "active participation" in the Mass. This primarily meant their active participation in joining their hearts to the heart of Christ in the Holy Sacrifice made present to them at every Mass. But it also included the greater use of Scripture in the Liturgy (understood by the faithful in their native tongue) and the dialogue parts of the Mass between the priest and the faithful (e.g., "The Lord be with you" ... "And with your spirit").

With the support of our musicians, I decided during Lent to introduce our community to a small use of Latin in the Liturgy with the Agnus Dei "Lamb of God." Again, this was something encouraged by the Council, especially with the ordinary parts of the Mass. Sacrosanctum Concilium stated: "...steps should be taken so that the faithful may also be able to say or to sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them" (SC, 54). The words to the Agnus Dei are (with the phonetic spelling underneath):

"Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi: miserere nobis" (twice)

Ag-noos Day-ee, qee toll-ees pec-a-ta mun-dee: mees-e-re-re no-bee-s

Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world: Have mercy on us.

"Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi: dona nobis pacem" **Ag-noos Day-ee, qee toll-ees pec-a-ta mun-dee: Doe-na no-bee-s pach-em**Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world: Grant us peace.

In the end, there are several reasons to use Latin, even when we are unfamiliar with it, during Mass:

It gives us continuity with our Catholic tradition and historical roots. Latin served as the language of the Roman Empire, and as Christianity spread throughout the West, it naturally became the language of the Western Church. Therefore, the use of Latin connects us as Catholics to the long and unbroken tradition of the Church, reaching back to its earliest centuries.

It is the universal language of the Church and transcends linguistic and cultural barriers throughout the Church (like in India!). The word "Catholic" means "universal." Latin fosters a sense of unity within the Church, as Catholics in different countries can participate in the same liturgy. Even today, when Catholics of diverse cultures and languages pray the Mass together, it is appropriate to use Latin in the ordinary parts of the Mass so we can all join in one voice!

It is a sacred language that transcends time. Over time, Latin acquired a sense of sacredness, as it is no longer used in the secular world. The use of a language distinct from everyday speech can heighten the sense of the sacred and the mystery of the liturgy, which contributes to a sense of solemnity and reverence, emphasizing its transcendent nature. Even though we may not know exactly the meaning of each word we are saying, we know all the different parts of the Mass by heart, and so Latin can help to lift us out of the immediate, temporal world and into the eternal realm of God as we sing with the angels and saints in one voice the hymn of unending praise: Sanctus, Sanctus, Holy, Holy, Holy,

MONTHLY FOOD DISTRIBUTION




