PONDERINGS OF THE PEDAL-N-PADRE

Dear Parish Family,

Peace in the Lord Jesus Christ...and praise Him as we begin construction at St. Thomas! I would like to express my gratitude to all who were able to attend the groundbreaking ceremony this past Sunday. It was a good start to the new and improved St. Thomas Chapel.

As mentioned in my bulletin article last week, you most certainly noticed the covered statues this weekend and will remain covered until the Easter Triduum. The reason I reintroduced this tradition this year is that, by covering the statues, the Church encourages us to focus on the coming Passion Week of the Lord. Please refer to last weekend's bulletin article for more details regarding the covering of the statues during the rest of the Lenten season.

Finally, the readings this weekend encourage us to "forget what lies behind and strain forward to what lies ahead." The first reading, from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, was a passage I spent a good deal of time in prayer with during my silent retreat: "Remember not the events of the past, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new! Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Is. 43). Often, we can become trapped in the past, and this can prevent us from moving forward with the Lord. It is like a "ball and chain" that we drag around, hindering us from following the Lord with "swiftness and quickness." In the context of Isaiah's words, the people are in exile, longing to return to the promised land. Isaiah tells them to remember not their past but to look to what the Lord is doing in their lives now.

St. Paul, in the second reading from the Letter to the Philippians, reminds himself and his readers: "Just one thing: forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead, I continue my pursuit toward the goal, the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 3) St. Paul, of course, was not a friend of Christians in his younger years. In fact, he oversaw severe persecution against Christians in Jerusalem and consented to the murder of St. Stephen, the first martyr of the Church. Of course, we know what happened to St. Paul: Jesus met him on the road to Damascus and "opened his eyes" to the truth of the Christian faith. St. Paul is now reminding himself and his readers not to be chained to the past but rather to strain forward to Christ Jesus. This is something the woman caught in adultery would soon have to put into practice in her own life. She herself most likely was guilty of more than just adultery in her past, but now her encounter with Jesus Christ and his "eyes of mercy" has changed her life. I suspect that the devil soon tried to remind her of her past, yet Christ was now calling her forward, to leave behind her past and to strain forward to him.

My dear friends in Christ, let not our past be a "ball and chain" that keeps us from straining forward and following Jesus. As I have often said and have heard elsewhere, every saint has a past, and every sinner has a future. May the readings this 5th Sunday of Lent encourage us not to remember the past but to strain forward towards the Lord, because he is always doing something new in our lives.

REFLECT

Each year, on the Second Sunday of Easter, the Church celebrates the Sunday of Divine Mercy, remembering the message Jesus so ardently instructed St. Faustina to spread of His endless mercy and forgiveness to those who seek it. Rooted in Christ's message of Divine Mercy is trust: trust that Jesus loves us, desires to heal our souls, and is with us.

This is an especially important message for expectant mothers preparing for the births of their children. They may often be gripped by fear and anxiety, without sources of support. May we prayerfully consider how we are called to help mothers who may be struggling in a particular way. And in our own lives, each of us is invited to come to Jesus just as we are and lay our cares, fears, and anxieties upon Him. The words Christ revealed to St. Faustina, He speaks to us and all who feel afraid: "Lay your head on my shoulder, rest and regain your strength. I am always with you" (Diary, no. 848). As we seek to live out the message of Divine Mercy, we pray for the courage for all to proclaim, "Jesus, I trust in you!"

ACT (choose one)

- Pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy (<u>usccb.org/divine-mercy-chaplet</u>) at 3:00 pm, the Hour of Mercy, for expectant mothers.
- Jesus spoke to St. Faustina, "Reveal all the wounds of your heart. I will heal them" (Diary, no. 1487). Expose the cuts and wounds of your heart to Christ and allow His healing mercy to reach every hurt and hidden pain through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.
- Offer some other sacrifice or prayer that you feel called to do for the featured intention.
